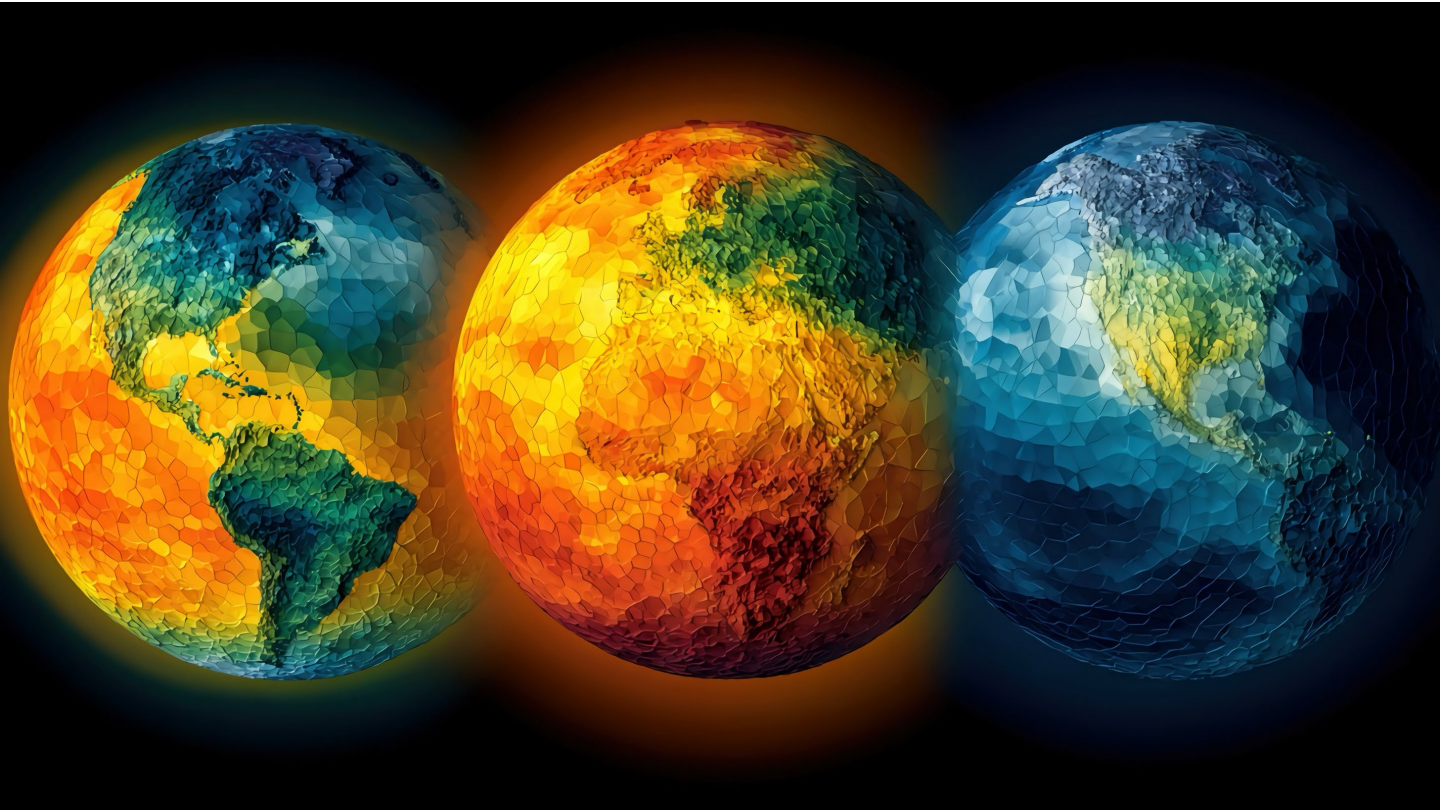

About this workshop

This workshop is part of a broader project examining how legal knowledge is taken up, and sometimes constrained, within global environmental assessments such as the IPCC and IPBES. These institutions often treat law as an instrumental tool, valued for its capacity to implement and organise, but seldom as a normative discipline in its own right. Legal reasoning, plurality, and contestation are largely absent, leading to a form of epistemic exclusion: law is included, but not on its own terms.

The workshop aims to rethink this dynamic. It brings together scholars from law, environmental science, philosophy, and policy to examine law's generative role in shaping just, legitimate and transformative environmental governance. We'll explore how law is currently engaged in assessment processes, what is lost when it is reduced to instrumentality, and what becomes possible when its full disciplinary range is brought back into view.

The program will feature two panel discussions and a collaborative roundtable.

Each activity will begin with a few short reflections (5–10 minutes each) from invited participants, followed by an open discussion with all attendees.
